



Publisher's Message



With the recent release of the movie "A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood," I've been reflecting a lot on what Fred McFeely Rogers meant to me in my life. I was a regular viewer of "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood" for at least three (around the ages of three to six) of the



most important developmental years of my life. Television programs for children of my generation were scarce, and our nation was dealing with some very dark times, so the news was always mustsee TV in most households. Bobby Kennedy was assassinated when I was three. The Vietnam war was always a big topic. Protests against the war were shown quite often, and words like military draft, Watergate, impeachment, and president resigns were in common use daily. Upon entering kindergarten, we started participating in this thing called a bomb drill. An alarm would ring, and we'd go out in the hall and sit down with our arms over our heads and between our knees. It was the times of the childhood of my generation. And while my parents, like most parents, tried to keep the children from being stressed and worried about what was going on in the world, the kids were without answers. That's where the simplistic genius of Fred Rogers and his television show found its calling. Mister Rogers used his talents to address real issues of our lives to children with a slow, gentle, and kind delivery. He'd use puppets to address the tough questions and concerns that

he felt children had, given our times. He addressed our range of feelings and that it was ok to feel a certain way, happy or sad, and then he shared how to deal with those feelings. He said he was proud me, and even sang it, and he hoped that I was proud of me too. I believe every one of his regular viewers felt that connection. And perhaps the most powerful message for me was him saying, "You are a very special person. There is only one like you in the whole world. There's never been anyone exactly like you before, and there will never be again. And people can like you exactly as you are."

I'm proud to say I'm a Mister Rogers kid. His legacy lives on with so many who enjoyed his show during such an impressionable time in our childhood. I hope that this movie introduces the great life work of this 1951 Rollins College graduate to the youth of today. Oh, and if you've never Googled "Fred Rogers testifies before the Senate," do it. It's brilliant, and there will never be another Fred McFeely Rogers.





I love the holidays in Orlando. There are so many ways to spend time with family and friends. If you haven't been downtown recently, December is a great month to visit one of our City jewels, Lake Eola, for many great events.

Enjoy the Eola Wonderland Christmas Tree Show Decem-

ber 6th through the 22nd at 5:45 p.m.; 6:45 p.m.; 7:45 p.m.; 8:45 p.m. and 9:45 p.m. The Eola Wonderland 72-foot Christmas tree will come alive with a synchronized light and music show while the Lake Eola fountain displays red, green and gold lights. Santa Claus will also be at the Eola House taking visitors on Fridays and Saturdays from 4:30 – 9 p.m. and on Sundays from 5-8 p.m.

Also at Lake Eola, enjoy holiday-themed movies, on Friday, December 13th; Friday, December 20th; and Saturday, December 27th. Also at Lake Eola, enjoy the annual Violetric Holiday Show at 7 p.m. on Saturday, December 14th; and "The Nutcracker" performed by the Russian Ballet Orlando on Saturday, December 21st at 7 p.m. at Lake Eola's Walt Disney Amphitheater.

In College Park, enjoy the annual Holiday on the Drive event taking place this year on Thursday, December 12th at 5 p.m. This event is the College Park Main Street's gift to the community and is free and open to the public. This year activities include a snow slide, rock climbing wall, train and horse drawn wagon rides, arts and crafts. Santa will be hanging out in the Albert Park gazebo and the local shops and restaurants along Edgewater Drive will be set up on the street along with over artisans for

local eating and shopping.

On Saturday, December 14th, enjoy the Winter Spark in Baldwin Park festival and parade in the Village Center near Harbor Park. The festivities begin at 4 p.m. with performances and photos with Santa with the event culminating with the parade starting at 7 p.m.

For our sports aficionados, join us after the holidays at Camping World Stadium for the Camping World Bowl on December 28th at noon, which pits the ACC vs. the Big 12; and the VRBO Citrus Bowl game on New Year's Day at 1 p.m. The seventh-oldest bowl game in the country, the Citrus Bowl was first played in 1947. Originally called the Tangerine Bowl, the initial game sponsors, members of Elks Lodge #1079 of Orlando, each put up \$100 to fund initial expenses. The game moved to the New Year's Day date in 1987 and since 1993 has hosted a matchup between the SEC and the Big Ten.



There is evidence that the bad guys go back to areas where they know there are a lot of cars in a small vicinity where they can make a quick grab. Please help us make it harder on criminals by locking your vehicles and securing your valuables especially when you have extra items at holiday time.

Looking back at 2019 and as we prepare to ring in 2020, I am extremely grateful for the opportunity to serve as the 54th mayor of the City of Winter Park. We live in the midst of a wonderful region and have worked to increase and improve the assets of our

hometown such as greenspace/parks/recreational areas, utilities, traffic, roadway improvements, advisory boards, etc. Thank you to residents, business partners, city staff and fellow commission members for your participation. At time of writing, below are a few of our highlights from 2019:

Enhanced the connectivity and development of the 55+ acre **Howell Branch Preserve** project by:

- Approving of the purchase of an additional 0.83 acre lot on Temple Trail
- Executing the grant agreement between the Florida Department of Environmental Protection ensuring the city's reimbursement for the purchase and the proposed improvements

Continued improvements to the Winter Park Golf Course WP9:

- Added more brick pavers and parking spaces to the lot.
- Celebrated the opening of the Charles H. Morse Park Moonlight Garden adjacent to the course. The garden's walkway runs all the way from the park entrance at Interlachen Avenue to historic Casa Feliz at the west end of the parking area.
- Increased the size of "The Back 9" putting course.

Renovated Azalea Lane Playground with a new shady pavilion, fresh landscaping, and improved climbing structures.

Installed a new geothermal pump to the Cady Way Pool, making swimming comfortable yearround regardless of the temperature outdoors.

Began the undergrounding of the overhead transmission and distribution lines along the southern side of **Fairbanks Avenue** between Harper Street and Interstate 4 to improve reliability and aesthetics of this gateway into Winter Park.

Reached electric utility goal by **undergrounding a total of 5.2 miles** of overhead lines throughout the city. This included the removal of the large power poles along North Lakemont Avenue.

Completed the **Denning Drive** Multi-Use project which received the 2019 Florida Redevelopment Association's Transportation Transit Enhancement Award. This project resulted in the transformation of Denning Drive from a four-lane road into an improved corridor offering a 10-footwide multi-use trail from Orange to Webster avenues enhancing the pedestrian and bicycle experience. The two-year long project was completed in three phases and included road milling, concrete median installation, asphalt paving, new irrigation, trees and landscaping, and installation of new decorative lighting.

Completed the **repaving and milling of Webster Avenue**, successfully enhancing this roadway's connection to the Denning Drive improvements.

Established the following task force and committees with very specific tasks and goals:

- Charter Review Advisory Committee to re view and recommend changes to the city's charter, which is reviewed every 10 years. Recommendations were made and approved by the Commission in October. Proposed charter amendments will be included in the 2020 election ballot.
- Old Library Site Reuse Task Force to evaluate the reuse of the library site located at 460 E. New England Ave. Recommendations were presented to the Commission in November.
- Orange Avenue Overlay Steering Committee to evaluate the potential creation of an Orange Avenue Overlay District and associated changes to the Land

Development Code and Comprehensive Plan. Recommendations are expected to be presented in January 2020.

Expected to complete Florida Department of Transportation construction to all railroad crossings in Winter Park making **all crossings Quiet Zone compliant**. Unless an emergency or danger is seen on the tracks, train engineers can use their discretion and are no longer required to sound train horns when passing through our city.

Installed **new bollard bases** on New England Avenue between New York and West Park avenues to allow for the use of bollards rather than barricades to close the road to vehicular traffic. These bollards are part of a safety pilot project and are used during the Saturday Farmers' Market as well as for other special events in this segment of New England Avenue.

Approved a **resolution** to begin the formal process of trying to **acquire the United States Post Office property** on New York Avenue.

Designated homes on Kilshore Lane and Howard Drive as **new historic resources** on the Winter Park Register of Historic Places.

Installed **new lake buoys** within the framework of state code bringing visual awareness of canal mouths, public docks and points that may create blind corners for boats on plane.

Celebrated the **Winter Park Farmers' Market's 40th** Anniversary. What began as a small market in 1979 with only eight vendors, has grown into an award-winning, thriving market with over 85 vendors that approximately 2,500 patrons enjoy every Saturday from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Launched a **Green Business Recognition Program** for companies that have adopted sustainable best practices. The program helps businesses become greener by providing a checklist to determine their recognition level, resources to help reach longer-term goals, and support of a peer network.

Survived the 2019 hurricane season with minimal damage and outages from Hurricane Dorian's unwelcomed visit. During Dorian, the city:

• Launched the first use of the newly developed online outage map system allowing customers to keep track of the areas of town experiencing an outage.

• As part of the city's established communication tools, the newly developed Emergency Information Facebook page was used as the primary account to communicate hurricane-related information. Followers to that page increased by approximately 292% during this year's hurricane season.

AdventHealth is gifting \$350,000 to Freedom Ride. These funds will allow the nonprofit to provide equine therapy to an additional 400 people and construct a riding arena.

Freedom Ride provides therapeutic equine riding to adults and children with a variety of conditions including autism, Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, brain injuries, PTSD and other mental health issues.

"We are committed to a health care philosophy that focuses on the whole person – body, mind and spirit. All three elements are instrumental in healing the individual and the greater community," said Daryl Tol, president and CEO of AdventHealth's Central Florida division. "Freedom Ride brings a unique approach to health care and we are pleased to help them expand their program. Freedom Ride started in 1998 with a focus on helping a child heal with the help of a special horse through equine therapy. The Orange County-based organization also provides scholarships to ensure no one is ever turned away due to an inability to pay. "Freedom Ride is thrilled to have AdventHealth 'Join the Ride' as we grow and expand our services for individuals living with disabilities and mental health issues," said Pat Michaels, president of Freedom Ride's board of directors. "Freedom Ride and AdventHealth are looking forward to growing their partnership as we construct the new AdventHealth Therapeutic Riding Arena at Bay Lake."

AdventHealth Winter Park Debuts Rehabilitation Center

From its specialty kitchens designed to help patients re-learn daily activities, to the overhead walking tracks, AdventHealth Winter Park opened its new inpatient rehabilitation unit in the Nicholson Pavilion on Tuesday. Sprawling across two floors of the new pavilion, the rehabilitation center brings AdventHealth Central Florida's inpatient rehab services to a single location.

"AdventHealth Winter Park was founded more than 60 years ago with the goal of creating a world-class hospital to serve the community's health needs close to home," said Jennifer Wandersleben, CEO of AdventHealth Winter Park. "The addition of the inpatient rehab unit to the Nicholson Pavilion allows us to provide stateof-the-art rehabilitation technology and care to patients who are recovering from traumatic and often life-altering injuries."

The fourth floor, coined the Body Restoring Center, provides specialty rehabilitative care for patients who suffered a spinal cord injury or those with a complex orthopedic diagnosis, medical complexities, or general neurological deficits. The fifth floor, called the Mind Restoring Center, offers specialty rehabilitation services for people recovering from a stroke or brain injury. The rehabilitation facility adds 60 private patient rooms across two floors. The Nicholson Pavilion now features 140 private patient rooms.

The expansion was generously supported by philanthropists Tony and Sonja Nicholson. The donation represents the largest investment in AdventHealth Winter Park's history, and marks one of the largest single investments in Winter Park's history.

A group of Central Florida theaters are coming together with Conway Cares to help children over the holidays. The collective includes Orlando Repertory Theatre, Orlando Shakes, Mad Cow Theatre, and Beth Marshall Presents with food drop-off locations at all four venues.

For the third year, Conway Cares – a Servant's Heart Ministry hunger solution – is receiving assistance from local theaters to ensure that children struggling with food insecurity are not forgotten during the holiday season. Items collected will then be distributed to four area schools and discreetly delivered to the children each Friday. This distribution ensures these children, who often rely on school breakfast and lunch programs as their main meal source, have food to sustain them over the weekends throughout the school year. All items can be dropped off at any of the above-listed theater locations during operating hours and during performance times. Preferred food items are:

- Fruit Cups/ Applesauce Cups
- Canned Pasta with easily removable lid
- Easy Mac
- Juice Boxes or Pouches
- Single-serve Cereals
- Peanut Butter Crackers
- Canned Veggies with easily removable lid

Conway Cares, a non-profit founded by Orlando Repertory Theatre's artistic director, Jeff Revels, has been serving the community since 2011. "After watching a 2011 *60 Minutes* report on children struggling with food insecurity right here in Central Florida, we started what has grown into Conway Cares the very next morning," said Revels.

Servant's Heart Ministries provides nutrition to society's most vulnerable: the children and seniors of Central Florida. As noted by the ministry, one in five children in Central Florida are struggling with issues of hunger. Servant's Heart Ministries coordinates with multiple local partners to train and equip them in the delivery of food directly to those in need. In conjunction with these local partners, the Ministries oversee the distribution of over 15,000 meals a year.

For Giving Tuesday this year, the staff of Orlando REP will be volunteering at the Servant's Heart warehouse.

Cybersecurity awareness by Ron Frechette, The Cyber Coach How Secure Is Your IT Managed Service Provider?

I am constantly amazed by the number of small-midsize business (SMB) owners who believe their IT Managed Service Providers (MSPs) have them covered when it comes to cybersecurity and compliance responsibilities. I get it. Most business

owners would assume that by outsourcing the management of their IT assets, the service provider should take on the liability of ensuring that the infrastructure is secure and compliant. Right? There is some truth to this, but on a very limited basis.

Before we decide to hand over the "keys to the kingdom" of managing our company's infrastructure to an MSP, we'll want to evaluate its qualifications and overall security posture. The challenge we find with many of our SMB clients is they're not entirely sure what type of questions to ask when evaluating an MSP. So, for this month, we will provide you with a list of questions you should be asking in order to ensure your infrastructure (and the sensitive data within it) is being managed in a secure and compliant manner.

Questions You Should Ask When Evaluating an MSP

- **1.** Do you perform annual third-party audits to demonstrate you are delivering services in a secure and compliant manner? Most MSPs will hire a certified third-party auditor to perform an annual security audit called an SOC 2 Type II. This annual audit provides evidence that the MSP is operating a highly secure, process-driven and dependable organization.
- **2.**Do you monitor your network for intrusion detection? For example, file-integrity monitoring tools in place to alert personnel to unauthorized changes of critical system files.
- **3.** Do you perform routine penetration tests on your Infrastructure? These tests validate the effectiveness of segmentation controls and should be performed every six months or after any major changes to controls..
- **4.** Do you outsource any of your services to a third-party provider (such as help desk support, monitoring, etc.)? If so, have you evaluated these third parties to ensure they are delivering services in a secure and compliant manner? As cybersecurity advisors, we are extremely wary of working with MSPs that outsource key functions of what they should be managing in house. This can be a huge red flag.
- **5.** How do you monitor our IT infrastructure to ensure that it has not been compromised and is running efficiently? A good MSP will have a Network Operations Center team responsible for the configuration, monitoring and management of your IT infrastructure.
- **6.** Do you have an Incident Response and what is your response time? Not having an incident response plan for their own business security should be a major red flag.
- **7.** Do you have a Disaster Recovery/Business Continuity Plan in place and how often is it tested?
- **8.**Can we schedule a site visit to see how you operate? We encourage all our clients to visit the MSP offices they are considering to manage their IT infrastructure.

Having worked and partnered with several MSPs over the past several years, I can attest that not all MSPs operate at the same level when it comes to security and compliance. As the Third Party Security Vetting Trend continues to evolve, many of our SMB clients are being required to provide evidence of having answers to these questions or

> they risk losing clients they have enjoyed conducting business with for years and remain competitive in today's Digital Age.

In closing, it cannot be assumed that an MSP will fill the role of a trained security specialist. Being conscious of the differences between IT and security is critical to having business processes that are both functional and secure. We challenge you to consider asking your MSP these pointed questions as we move into 2020! If you are not comfortable conducting interviews with MSPs, consider hiring a security consultant that can speak on your behalf. A third-party security consultant can work with you and potential service providers to ensure your IT infrastructure is designed with your company's best interests in mind.

Helpful Hints 2.0

Reduce labor: ornamental grasses typically need trimming only once every one-to-three years. Compare that frequency

to most other plants.

Save steps: cover every square inch of the garden by installing a hose reel with hoses of appropriate lengths at each corner of the house.

Back saving: a hand truck with balloon tires is a must for moving containers and other items around the garden without getting bogged down in the soil.

Water savings: check the irrigation system monthly for breaks or leaks.

Keep it level: when placing containers on soil, use a levelled large steppingstone set on well-compacted soil without vegetative matter underneath.

Smart feeding: make sure the plant is well watered before applying liquid fertilizer.

Reduce labor: a yard cart hauls a diversity of materials and can dump them.

Efficiency: to eliminate flat wheelbarrow tires, replace an air-filled one with a solid one.

Smart planning: when planting next to hard surfaces such as driveways or sidewalks, lower the grade so that after planting, it is three to four inches lower than the top of the hard surface. This will help hold the mulch in place.

Pain relief: use duct tape to remove cactus spines from body parts.

Money saving: epoxy the inside of cracked containers and place the cracked side out of the line of sight.

Yummy plants: to encourage their use, place herbs in a sunny spot as close as possible to the kitchen door.

Water savings: install a smart irrigation controller. If you live in Winter Park apply for a \$100 rebate – search Winter Park Weather Based Smart Irrigation Controllers. Call 407-599-3597 for more information.

Take control: keep vines out of trees to prevent additional wind load and moisture held against the bark.

Pain relief: immediately use a meat tenderizer with some water to make a paste to apply to ant bites or bee stings.

Trunk strengthening: During tree planting, make sure a stake it is not tightly tied to the trunk or rubbing against it. Trees need to move in the

breeze, so their trunks develop properly and not flop over.

Smart planting: install plants so the top roots at the trunk / stem are about one inch above the soil. If needed, remove soil above the roots

Proper pruning: when trimming branches do not leave stubs.

Brrrr: when a freeze is predicted, turn off the irrigation so plants aren't damaged by ice.


